

WELCOME TO PARIS!

The UIA Congress returns to Paris for the first time since 2007!

Paris, a mythical city, is a true source of international inspiration for many artists, photographers and musicians. Parisian monuments, with their history and impressive architecture, are undeniably part of the charm of the French capital.

Paris can not only be visited; it can also be experienced: Paris is the capital of gastronomy, fashion and shopping; a coffee on a terrace in one of the "Parisian bistros", a meal on the terrace in a brasserie, a sumptuous dinner in a gourmet restaurant... Committed to quality of life and sustainable development, the city offers a particularly pleasant environment to its inhabitants and visitors.

ENTRY FORMALITIES

Nationals of EU Member States, Switzerland and the United Kingdom do not need a visa for stays of less than three months. However, they must be in possession of a valid National Identity Card or Passport.

Passport holders from countries other than EU Member States, Switzerland or the United Kingdom should consult the government website, which lists the countries whose citizens do not require a visa for short stays. If, however, you are a citizen of a country that is subject to the visa obligation, please contact the French embassy or consulate in your country of residence in order to obtain a visa:: https://www.service-public.fr/particuliers/vosdroits/R50475

We strongly advise those who require a visa to proceed with their visa application as early as possible.

ACCOMMODATION



Should and can artificial intelligence be regulated? Worldwide, the technological landscape is today largely driven by what seems to be an exponential development of Artificial Intelligence tools, based on powerful algorithms and known as "systems". Some say that we are facing the "most profound human revolution in history". In this new landscape, new issues are beginning to emerge, including the fundamental question of regulation. Should AI systems be regulated, and if so, how? In this Main Theme morning session, three discussion panels will analyse the issues, from both generalist and specialist perspectives. A first, multidisciplinary panel of international experts will examine the philosophical and socioeconomic underpinnings of any regulation of Artificial Intelligence as the most technologically-advanced tool that mankind has ever used on a broad scale. This will lead to a second panel, involving a round table discussion about their respective regulatory objectives by representatives and experts of the world's leading economic blocs (United States of America, European Union, China). Finally, a third panel will take a deep dive into the considerable changes in process and procedure in judicial litigation and arbitration which may result from the use of generative AI systems as virtual legal "assistants" by litigators: a new "eldorado" for litigators? Is there a need to revise the rules of litigation to take generative AI tools into account?

OHADA Law Room 341	Compliance in the service of investment in OHADA law: challenges, issues and perspectives Africa is the continent of all paradoxes. The most encouraging prospects for economic growth, particularly in the post-Covid context and despite the Ukrainian crisis, come with the most alarming figures in terms of corruption and illicit financial flows. Corruption and therefore non-compliance with standards, at all levels of economic life, is unanimously recognized as one of the major obstacles to investment and the emergence of the African economy. In order to contribute to the development of possible solutions to this scourge, on the one hand, and to improving the efficiency of OHADA's normative corpus on the other hand, in terms of its aim of attracting and protecting investment, it has been proposed that the first session – both analytical and prospective – be organized on the subject of compliance in the service of investment in OHADA law (Organization for the Harmonization of Business Law in Africa). The Impact Of Labor Law On Foreign Investments When a particular company decides invest in a foreign state, it analyses the project's feasibility from different perspectives. It is a matter of exploring and concluding on how an organization will manage the risks and opportunities. The analysis is naturally focused on certain classic aspects such as the expected economic profitability, the tax conditions, the financing situation. the market, among others. However, we have all witnessed how, in recent years, the concept of ESG (Environmental, Social and Governance) has gained fundamental importance when conducting the analysis of a foreign investment project. In this joint session of the Foreign Investment Commission and the Labor Law Commission, we will concentrate on the Social and Governance effects of a foreign investment. Furthermore, we will focus on analyzing the impact of labor law on foreign investments. We will examine how projects of this nature are affected by: labor law regulations; the legal and factual situation of workers' unions; the existence of collective labor agreements; the different alternatives in hiring conditions; the necessity and/or convenience of hiring local personnel or, on the contrary, sending expatriates, etc. In many jurisdictions, especially when dealing with developing countries, we encounter significant obstacles when trying to find creative solutions to labor law-related aspects due to the inflexibility of existing regulations or the strong presence of unions. We will explore from the labor law perspective: the liabilities involved in projects involving M&A transactions; the advantages and disadvantages of resorting to the acquisition of goodwill instead of purchasing the shares of a company; the effects of downsizing the number of employees if necessary; the different alternatives to solve disputes; how to create a friendly and collaborative atmosphere between the investing company and the local community; etc. In our session, we will learn from experts in this field about the situation in their respective jurisdictions. We are confident that a rich debate will arise in the exchange of opinions by sharing experiences we have all faced in our professional lives.

Theme Representation of foreign victims in a trial

Are you, or do you know, a lawyer in your country who could represent foreign victims or their family during a criminal investigation and trial and explain them their rights?

Initially this was a request from the French prosecutor concerned about the protection of his compatriots abroad. - Can victims assert their rights to criminal damages, like civil parties in France, or only before a civil judge?
- Are there any victim support associations in your jurisdiction?
- How long does a trial last? After how long can we expect to obtain a ruling on the damages? Incidentally, with regard to costs and lawyer's fees:
- What are the fees for assisting a victim? Do you know of any examples?
- Would you be ready to work pro bono?
- Can you ask for only result-based fees?
- Can a French victim get a lawyer through legal aid services and if so, under what conditions?

Transition to a sustainable and healthy agri-food system: the law as a driver for establishing a partnership for people, planet and climate.

Recent studies made by system climate scientists at the University of Illinois and published on Nature Food review have found that global production of food is responsible for a third of all planet-heating gases emitted by human activity. The raising and culling of animals for food is far worse for the climate than growing and processing fruits and vegetables for people to eat, and use of animals for meat, particularly beef, seems to cause twice the pollution of producing plant-based foods. The entire cycle of food production system, such as the use of farming machinery, spraying of fertilizer and transportation of products, causes 17.3bn metric tons of greenhouse gases a year, according to the research. This enormous release of gases that fuel the climate crisis represents 35% of all global emissions, researchers say, and policymakers should avail of the results to think about how to control

greenhouse gas emissions. The panel intends to jointly consider the legal aspect of the various related aspects from different angles, including how supranational and national regulations intend to counteract the effects of climate change, how lawyers can contribute to sustainable development, ensuring the control of food quality and origin in a changing environment. This is to be done in parallel with scientific development - to achieve solutions involving better management of the planet's animal and plant heritage, making use of new cultivation and breeding techniques, combined with products made in the laboratory. And this is to be done while guaranteeing freedom of research on the one hand and assessing their possible long-term effects on the human body on the other, given the complexity and novelty of the production processes. The UIA reserves the right to cancel or postpone the Congress to a later date, change the Congress venue and/or programme, make any corrections or modifications in the information published in the Congress programme and cancel any invitation to participate in the Congress, at any time and at their discretion, without having to provide any reasons.

Neither the UIA, nor any of its managers, employees, agents, members or representatives shall be held responsible for any loss or damage, of any nature, suffered (directly or indirectly) by a Congress delegate, accompanying person or a third party following any cancellations, changes, postponements or modifications.

Neither the UIA, nor any of its managers, employees, agents, members or representatives shall be held responsible for any loss or damage, of any nature whatever, suffered (directly or indirectly) by a Congress delegate or accompanying person, except in case of death or personal injury due to gross negligence by the UIA.

The contractual relationship between the UIA and each participant (Congress delegate or accompanying person) in relation to the Congress are governed exclusively by French law. All dispute arising therefrom shall be resolved exclusively by the courts of Paris, France.

For accommodation for the Congress, the contractual relationship will be established directly between Bnetwork and each participant.

Formalities

It is the responsibility of Congress participants to ensure compliance with police, customs and health formalities for their journey. Congress participants unable to take part in the Congress because of their inability to take a flight or any other means of transportation due to being unable to provide the documents required (passport, visa, vaccination certificate, etc.) cannot claim any reimbursement.

Force Majeure

"Force majeure" means any event external to the parties, of both an unforeseeable and insurmountable nature, that prevents either the client or the participants, or the agency or service providers involved in organizing the Congress, from executing all or part of the obligations provided for in the present agreement. By express agreement, such will be the case in the event of a strike affecting the means of transport, hotel staff, air traffic controllers, an insurrection, a riot or any prohibition whatever decreed by Governmental or public authorities. It is expressly agreed that for the parties, a case of force majeure would suspend the execution of their reciprocal obligations. At the same time, each of the parties shall be responsible for all the expenses incumbent upon them, resulting from the case of force majeure.

Health

The UIA declines any liability in case of any health problems that may lead to complications or be aggravated during any part of the stay: pregnancy, cardio-vascular problems, any allergies, special diets, any disorders under treatment and not yet resolved on the day the Congress starts, psychological, mental or depressive illness, etc. (Non-exhaustive list).

Data Protection Policy

Personal data collected is processed by the Union Internationale des Avocats, in its capacity as data controller. The data is used to manage registrations for events organised by the Union Internationale des Avocats.

In accordance with the applicable regulations, you have the right to access, rectify and delete your personal data, as well as the right to data portability. You may also withdraw your consent to the processing of your personal data at any time or request that such processing be restricted.

Finally, you have the right to specify instructions concerning the fate of your data in the event of your demise.

Cancellation Terms

Cancellation of Registration for the Congress / Gala Dinner

All cancellations will be subject to a 20% processing fee and must be sent in writing to the UIA (uiacentre@uianet.org) no later than September 30, 2024. There will be no refunds for cancellations received after this date, not even for cancellations due to medical reasons.

The UIA strongly advises participants to take out a cancellation insurance.

Participants who have paid the total registration fee and who are unable to attend the Congress personally may send a colleague as a substitute after informing the UIA. A €50 processing fee will be charged.

All refunds will be paid after the Congress.

Invitation Letters

If you require an official invitation letter in order to obtain a visa, please:

- Register for the Congress and pay the registration fees as early as possible and no later than September 8, 2024 to ensure there is enough time to obtain a visa;
- Submit your request for an invitation letter no later than **September 8, 2024**. Invitation letters cannot be guaranteed after this date.

Applying for your visa

Once you have your invitation letter, you will need to apply for your visa. You are urged to contact the nearest French embassy or consulate as early as possible to determine where you should apply. You should also ask how long completing the visa process normally takes.

Registration refunds due to visa refusal

If you are refused a visa and you applied for your visa before September 8, 2024, we will refund your registration fees minus €50 to cover administrative costs. To be considered for a registration refund, please:


- Submit proof of a visa refusal to the UIA (uiacentre@uianet.org) before the Congress;
- Submit a stamped copy of your visa application form (showing that you applied before September 8, 2024) before the Congress.

If your visa is issued after the Congress date or if you do not have proof of a visa refusal, you will not be entitled to a refund.

Assistance / Repatriation Insurance (at your own expense)

With regard to your participation in the Congress, we recommend that you purchase an insurance policy providing hospitalization and medical expenses coverage.

For your information, insurance may be included if you pay with some credit cards (please check with your bank to obtain details about such coverage). The UIA declines all liability in case a Congress participant fails to purchase such an insurance policy.


