Dear friends and colleagues,

Our Congress, the flagship event organised every year by our beloved UIA, is drawing closer. On the other hand, they call into question the obligation of these States to reach an international consensus in the form of clear rules, which ensure the legal security of people – all people – in the face of the great uncertainties of life.

Both subjects call for a calm technical and legal debate that can also contribute to the search for realistic solutions. Through the 45 working sessions scheduled and by listening to the 300 speakers – with all the variety and depth stemming from the diversity of the origins of the speakers and participants, coming from more than 80 countries – I am convinced that we will make concrete progress in the quest for realistic and viable solutions to these issues, which call into question the very essence of our capacity as lawyers.

We will be able to reflect on all this in the incomparable setting of a city that will undoubtedly leave lasting memories for all of us. For me, this will be a unique opportunity, as the Congress will take place during my term of office, and I look forward to seeing you all there in person!

WELCOME TO ROME!

For the first time since its foundation in 1927, the UIA will hold its Annual Congress in the Italian capital, Rome.

With its thousand-year-old history, Rome is the city with the highest concentration of historical and architectural assets in the world. Its historic centre is bounded by the Aurelian Walls, which alone contain several overlays that bear witness to almost three thousand years of history. It is an expression of the historical, artistic and cultural heritage of Western Europe.

As the cradle of the *dolce vita*, Rome and its region offer a wide range of possibilities to visitors, with a myriad of restaurants, breath-taking scenery, lively nightlife and the famous Italian hospitality.

ENTRY FORMALITIES

Nationals of EU Member States, Switzerland and the United Kingdom do not need a visa for stays of less than three months. However, they must be in possession of a valid National Identity Card or Passport.

Passport holders from countries other than EU Member States, Switzerland or the United Kingdom should consult the government website, which lists the countries whose citizens do not require a visa for short stays. If, however, you are a citizen of a country that is subject to the visa obligation, please contact the Italian embassy or consulate in your country of residence in order to obtain a visa:

We strongly advise those who require a visa to proceed with their visa application as early as possible.

HEALTH

Since 1st June 2022, travellers are allowed to enter Italy without presenting any proof of vaccination against Covid-19 or a negative PCR test.

TRANSPORT

Direct flights serve Rome on several airlines. You can benefit from attractive rates if you book your flight online as early as possible.

ACCOMMODATION

The hotels selected by the UIA are located in Rome, about 15 minutes by car from the Congress venue. You can book your accommodation online at: www.uiacongress.bnetwork.com

We are offering reduced rates that have been specifically negotiated for the UIA Congress. Breakfast is included in the room price of all the suggested hotels.

Due to high demand, hotels are filling up very quickly in Rome. Considering the limited number of rooms and the fact that preferential rates cannot be guaranteed for more than the number of rooms reserved by the UIA, we recommend that you make your hotel reservation as early as possible!

TRANSFERS

The UIA will not provide shuttle services from the airport or from the train station. Roma Fiumicino international airport is located 33 km from the Parco dei Principi Hotel. It takes around 45-50 minutes to go from the airport to the Parco dei Principi by taxi depending on traffic conditions. You can also reach the city centre with the Leonardo Express, a non-stop service dedicated exclusively to airport passengers, from/to Rome Termini central station with departures every 15 minutes and a journey time of 32 minutes. 



Governments worldwide have had to urgently react to the unprecedented challenges arising as a result of the Taliban takeover in Afghanistan, the Russian invasion of Ukraine and more recently armed conflict in Khartoum and the Darfur region of Sudan. More long-standing policy and legal challenges must also be considered in this context, including the approach taken to migrants seeking to enter Europe across the Mediterranean, the mass displacement of refugees fleeing Venezuela due to unprecedented political turmoil and socio-economic instability as well as the significant increase in intra-African migration over the course of the 21st century. This panel will investigate the approaches that have been taken in various jurisdictions internationally to address challenges arising from immediate humanitarian crises, more established migration patterns and human rights issues pertaining to the movement of people. 

<p>Foreign Investment / Human Rights</p> <p>Ruspoli + Torlonia Room</p>	<p>The Impact of Foreign Investment on Human Rights. Are Current Regulations Adequate or is there Room for Improvement?</p> <p>The Human Rights and the Foreign Investment Commissions will be holding a joint session to discuss the effects of foreign investment on human rights and its impacts on migration, freedom of movement, and visa processes.</p> <p>The question around which our debate will be focused is: Are current regulations adequate or is there room for improvement?</p> <p>Foreign investments can be both positive and negative in terms of human rights.</p> <p>On the positive side, foreign investment can lead to economic development, job opportunities, more access to education, healthcare, and other basic services that would help to reduce poverty, inequality and social exclusion, which in turn would mean the promotion of the rule of law and finally: improvements in human rights.</p> <p>On the other hand, foreign investments could have a negative effect on human rights if they are not properly regulated. In particular, foreign investments could lead to exploitation of natural resources, displacement of local communities, and displacement of workers due to the introduction of new technologies among others.</p> <p>At the same time, foreign investments and migration are two interrelated phenomena that have been inextricably linked together since the dawn of globalization. Migration is a fundamental component of human development, essential for the growth of nations. While regional and international instruments and jurisprudence acknowledge an enhanced protection to freedom of expression of lawyers, this protection cannot be considered absolute. The first part of the discussion will therefore focus on addressing the scope of this protection inside and outside the courtroom - including in social media and the press - and, in particular, outlining justification for legitimate limitations in order to guarantee that they are not misused to validate unwarranted restrictions and arbitrarily silence lawyers. We will look at specific egregious countries and cases of concerns, and actions taken, for protecting the freedom of expression of lawyers.</p> <p>Strengthening and improving guarantees for the legal profession</p> <p>In a context of increasingly frequent, various and serious attacks and interferences on the independence of the legal profession, and against lawyers individually, effectively strengthening international, regional and domestic standards of protection appears more urgent than ever. This concern is at the heart of the Council of Europe's current process of elaboration of a legal instrument on the legal profession, and has been expressly identified as a challenge by the newly appointed Special Rapporteur on the independence of judges and lawyers, Ms Margaret Satterthwaite, in her first report. Stripe has recently reported that more than half of the European start-ups surveyed said the time spent on compliance processes is the greatest threat to their business. According to a new Stripe report, one out of three start-ups has considered starting their business outside of Europe due to the level of regulatory obligations and compliance issues. The wave of regulation is not limited to Europe alone. Since 2020, the Canada has subjected all automated decision making systems delivered to the government to algorithmic impact assessments. In 2022, New York City passed a law requiring companies providing AI that helps make hiring decisions to obtain “bias audits” of their technology. The District of Columbia may pass a bill that would force entities using algorithmic tools to determine employment, housing or loan eligibility to disclose the algorithms and the data used to train them and be audited. The Federal Trade Commission and a number of Congressmen want to hold companies responsible for harm and discrimination caused by AI systems.</p> <p>The joint session between the IT and Start up Commissions will examine the implications for start-ups worldwide of the recent European legislation, including the GDPR, the Digital Markets Act and the proposed Artificial Intelligence Act which not only have extra-territorial reach but also aim to be the gold standard for regulation to be emulated worldwide. 




